

A Journey of Pain, Hope, and Humanity

How One Child's Fight United a Family, Safdarjung Hospital, and Krishnavi Charitable Trust

At an age when children dream about school, friends, and games, 12-year-old Aman has spent years battling pain, surgeries, and uncertainty. Hailing from a humble family in Bijnor, Aman's life changed forever after a tragic accident during play on 22 December 2022. A severe fracture in his leg not only shattered his bones but also placed an unbearable burden on a family already struggling to survive.



Aman lost his father at a young age. Since then, his widowed mother and sisters have carried the responsibility of holding the family together. One of his sisters works tirelessly to earn enough money for food, medicines, and travel to hospitals, while his mother spends sleepless nights praying for her son's recovery. Every hospital visit meant another sacrifice — borrowed money, missed meals, and days filled with fear about what the future would bring.

That painful night in December 2022, Aman was rushed to the emergency Orthopaedics Ward of Safdarjung Hospital. Doctors immediately admitted him and performed surgery to stabilize his fractured leg with a fixator. For the family, the hospital became more than a treatment centre — it became the place where hope still existed. From January 2023 to December 2024, Aman continued regular follow-ups in the OPD, moving from one dressing room to another, from X-rays to painful examinations, while his family waited anxiously outside every ward door.

Despite continuous treatment, his leg did not heal properly. The family knocked on many doors seeking financial help, but poverty often leaves people unheard. There were moments when Aman's mother feared her son might never walk properly again. Yet amid this darkness, compassion found its way to them through the doctors of Safdarjung Hospital.

Seeing the family's helpless condition, orthopaedic specialist Dr. Ashish Jayman introduced them to **Anil Saxena from Krishnavi Charitable Trust**. That meeting became a turning point in Aman's life.

The Trust listened to the family not as strangers, but with empathy and responsibility. When doctors advised a complex circular fixator surgery costing ₹57,700 in January 2025, Aman's family had no way to arrange the amount. For them, even daily survival was

difficult. But Krishnavi Charitable Trust stepped forward without hesitation and ensured the surgery was completed successfully on 22 January 2025.

For Aman's mother, it was the first moment in years when she felt they were not fighting alone.

Even after the surgery, Aman's recovery remained difficult. His fragile young body continued to suffer, and when his condition did not improve as expected, he was referred to orthopedic surgeon Dr. Vikas Gupta. After evaluation in April 2026, doctors advised yet another surgery costing nearly ₹37,000.

The news broke the family emotionally. They had already exhausted every possible resource. But once again, Krishnavi Charitable Trust stood beside Aman like a guardian during his darkest hour. The Trust arranged support for his third surgery, which was successfully performed on 5 May 2026 at Safdarjung Hospital.

Today, Aman lies in Ward 29A, Bed No. 4, still recovering under the supervision of doctors. His journey is not over, but neither is the support surrounding him.

This story is not only about a child suffering from a fracture. It is about a grieving family refusing to give up on their son. It is about doctors in a government hospital who looked beyond medical files and saw human pain. And it is about Krishnavi Charitable Trust, which became a lifeline for a child whose dreams could have been lost to poverty.

Together, the family, the doctors of Safdarjung Hospital, and Krishnavi Charitable Trust created something far greater than treatment — they created hope.

Aman's story is not just about medical treatment. It is a story of resilience, compassion, and humanity. In moments when his family had lost hope, Krishnavi Charitable Trust became their strongest support system — ensuring that poverty did not decide the fate of a child fighting to walk again.
